

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid. I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people."

So, we've made it through another Christmas season. For me it was my 74th time of celebrating the coming of God into this world

in the form of a human being. Seventy-four times of singing the great old Christmas carols. Seventy-four times of decorating a tree and eating Christmas turkey. During those 74 years this world has experienced some daunting challenges. I was too young to remember Pearl Harbor. But I do remember the war and how we were required to cover our windows at night with dark shades. And I remember collecting empty tin cans and throwing them on the truck that came through our neighborhood every Saturday so they could be recycled into bullets. And I remember the fear that folks in our neighborhood just outside of Washington DC had about the possibility that we were going to be bombed. Fear is a terrible thing. Like a cancer, it can eat away at your spirit and cause you to act in ways that are not rational, nor loving.

Think of the ways that we have experienced fear over the past few years. Political pundits know that people will vote their fears at the polls. All an opposition candidate has to do is convince the public that his opponent is in league with the devil, or will destroy the country, or will take away your constitutional rights. The charges don't have to be true or even based on fact. All they have to do is whip up that latent fear that rests in the depths of our spirits. Who was it who said: "All we have to fear is fear itself."? I think it was FDR!

One of the fundamental tenants of the Christian Faith is our rejection of fear. The angels appeared to the shepherds on the hillside and they were afraid, afraid of something that they did not know, afraid of something new, afraid of powers and forces over which they had no power. The angel of The Lord told them not to be afraid. Well, that is easy to say. When you are up to you neck in alligators it's too easy for someone to call out from the shore, "Don't be afraid!" What you need to hear is: "Don't be afraid, grab on to the boat behind you and we'll pull you in." The message to us is "don't be afraid, behold, I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people." You and I can let fear go when we know that something phenomenal is happening that will counteract the forces which cause us to fear. You see, what the Christian faith is calling us to do is reject fear. Reject fear that would cause us to say and do those kinds of things that are counter to the teachings and life of Jesus Christ.

Now, don't get me wrong, there is a place for fear. The Old Testament is quite clear that "fear" is an essential ingredient in the believer's respect of God. Proverbs 9:10 "The first step to wisdom is the fear of the Lord." Proverbs 14:27 "The fear of the Lord is the fountain of life." The author of 1 Peter gives us this admonition, "Give due honor to everyone, love the brotherhood, fear God, and honor the emperor." However, it is not only the angels appearing to the shepherds who tell us not to fear. Time after time, Jesus admonished his disciples to reject fear. Look up Matthew 10:26, 10:28, 10:31, 14:27, and 17:07. Also, look up Luke 12:7, 12:32.

So, where is all this leading us? We are entering a new year. 2015 will bring us lots of opportunities to let fear control us. There are those who would use "fear" as a weapon to whip us into a frenzy of reaction and retaliation.

When you feel this beginning to happen, remember the words of the angel to the shepherds. "Do not be afraid!"

God is in the process of bringing about new possibilities, new opportunities, new vistas of service in love and grace. You can be a part of these new and exciting possibilities. In your personal life look for the hope that nullifies fear. In your church life look for the hope that looks forward instead of the fear that looks backwards. And may 2015 be a year of abundant grace and hopeful renewal for the fellowship of Christ here at Tazewell Presbyterian.

Tazewell



During January we will concentrate on the work that we are doing in Ethiopia. Tazewell Presbyterian Church is a direct supporter of Presbyterian Missionaries, Rachel and Michael Weller. Michael is the regional director of our Presbyterian work in that area of Africa. I want to share with you several excerpts from Rachel's October letter to the church back home in the US.

October 22, 2014 (Rachel writes...)

I am back. Back from Kenya; back from the Community Health Evangelism (CHE) Internship; back from Addis, where I stayed a couple weeks to see Michael and get my computer fixed. We are thankful that we have a house – not a guesthouse – to stay in there. It means minimal unpacking, knowing that there is food in the cupboards and some in the freezer, and coffee ready to brew. We share the house with John and Gwen Haspells, who also live a bit of a mobile life as they come and go from southwestern Ethiopia where they have been working for the past couple of decades. So we were shocked the day that John called Michael on the phone saying, "We've been shot!" That day Michael was driving through Addis traffic when his phone rang. He decided to answer it - he could just quickly tell John he'd call him back as soon as he pulled over. But with that greeting, everything changed. He stayed on the phone with John long enough to find out that John was driving, but could not see from one eye and the other had blood dripping into it. Shots had gone through Gwen's lower face, so she held her own face while dabbing the blood from John's eye so he could keep driving. Miraculously, neither of them ever fainted. Miraculously, they had their travel documents in hand. Miraculously, t he phone system was working. And miraculously, everything fell into place as Michael called the various agencies, including our support system in Louisville, to get them help at the closest hospital (four hours driving) and then evacuate them the next day to Addis and then South Africa, where they are now receiving excellent medical care. To be clear, it was a random shooting and would-be attempted robbery. They were probably not being targeted, nor was it a political or religious act. The Haspellses immediately sent a message to the Suri people that, though they were in pain, they offered forgiveness to those who had hurt them and wished that they would know the forgiving love of Jesus. What an exciting story about the mission work that we Presbyterians are doing in Africa.

Just a reminder that there is much to do and much to overcome in a land where we Presbyterians have been declaring the Gospel for less than 300 years. Next month we will visit the Wellers again to learn how Rachel is working throughout Ethiopia to teach agricultural practices and hygiene practices which promote healthier families and communities. Meanwhile, Rachel sends this final message: *Michael and I are thankful for all of you who support us regularly. Your prayers sustain us, your emails and communications encourage us, and your offerings keep us working.*

On December 19 I received a phone call from a Mr. Smythe of Samaritan's Purse, representing Franklin Graham, to thank our church for all we gave and for being the receiving point for our community. Their goal for this year is 8.3 million boxes and as of December 19 they had 7.9 million. We gave 118 from the town church and 107 from Black's Chapel. We had 15 volunteers working 67 hours and David Pruitt and I took 515 boxes to the Richlands Presbyterian Church to be shipped.
